Dear Friends,

If you are receiving this newsletter, it is because you have contributed to Thursday's Child in 2022. Most of you have supported us for a very long time, and without you, we could not ever do the things we do.

We are always grateful when area clubs support us. There are many worthwhile organizations that need money and we are honored when they choose us.

The Mount Hope Cardinals 4-H Club sent a donation in February along with a note: "We appreciate all you do for the children and families in our area."

Longtime Cassville friends and Thursday's Child supporters sent a note with a post-Christmas contribution: "At our Christmas family celebration our grandchildren compiled money to donate to Thursday's Child, in which we added our own amount. We trust that our donation will put smiles on children's faces."

Also from Cassville, St. Charles NCCW Foreign Relief always remembers us, as well.

Then there are the families of the children we serve. One mom sent us a contribution in honor of her son who was a Disney World traveler in 1993. He beat his cancer and is doing well today.

Another family remembers us every single year for our efforts to get them to a Packer's Game, which we did, but it wasn't easy! (It was a very cold day, too). For that one, we had some help from Craig Culver and friends in Green Bay.

Close to home for me, The Santa Cause 5K was back in action in 2021. Organizers Melissa and Jenni Martinez, Platteville, sent us a check with this note: "We had a wonderful day and a wonderful group of giving individuals who made our event a success."

Each Memorial contribution this year has special

significance for me. My mother, Dorothy, died in 2016 and as most of you know, she was the heart and soul of Thursday's Child. My uncle, her brother, died unexpectedly in January 2020, two days short of his 86th birthday, just at the beginning of the pandemic. Ronald Hunter was a member of a four-generation friendship between our families. Kelly Meier was my talented young student in Cassville. Her mother, Sandy, is a member of our Board of Directors.

Shawn Triller was the General Manager of Wingra Redi-Mix during Thursday's Child DOZER DAYS years. He was directly responsible for the success of this extraordinary fund raiser. He died suddenly last December 19 at the age of 67. His family directed his memorials to organizations he "felt a strong connection to," one of those being Thursday's Child. We received many contributions in his memory from his family and friends.

People have asked me if I ever meet the children we serve. No, not usually, but through my communication with families, social workers and doctors as we work to set up their special wishes, I often feel like I get to know them. That was certainly how it was with Caleb Wipperfurth and his lovely family. His passion for Star Wars and Marvel and other fascinating worlds that encourage a young person's imagination led us to make arrangements for a few days in California where we worked a little Star Wars magic and also sent him to Disneyland's Avengers Campus for a day. Caleb died on November 7 after a long and challenging fight against Ewing's Sarcoma. He was a determined young man with a brilliant mind. A freshman in college, he aspired to become a computer engineer. As I write this, I'm looking at his picture which I framed, a grinning kid enjoying the California sunshine.

So many more individuals and organizations have, every year, contributed to Thursday's Child, and to the happiness of many children and their siblings. We are so thankful to all of you.

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
